ORGANIZATION OVERVIEW

Hope Spring For All Nations (HSFAN) is a children driven as well as women driven Non-Profit and Non-Governmental Organization. It is as well, a people driven NGO that works for the promotion of Gender Equality and Women Empowerment in the communities, villages, and towns. **Hope Spring For All Nations** strives to improve quality education for all children there by enhancing a future generation of responsible citizens who will commit to improve the situation of their respective nations and bring about peaceful solutions to the issues of the state.

HSFAN was created in the year 2022 by some generous citizens who are concerned with the plight of children and women especially the most vulnerable persons in our communities. HSFAN's priority are the youths, children whose parents are unable to provide for the school and health needs and minority groups such as widows, single mothers, displaced persons and their families, orphans and children in distress, and persons suffering from diseases such as HIV and AIDS infected persons and fight against malarial infections among children. As such, Hope Spring For All Nations (HSFAN) has been involved in activities relating menstrual hygiene of girls in schools and communities in the Southwest Region of Cameroon, assessment of human rights violation and abuse in the Buea Municipality.

Sustainable livelihood programs through agricultural projects are being carried out in the English Speaking Regions of Cameroon with an objective to assist internally displaced persons and the most vulnerable people of the communities to be able to sustain a decent life and to have some basic needs for better living. HSFAN is committed to the respect of human right values as well as the dignity of people and their rights in the area of Sexual and Gender Based Violence, children's right to education, food, health and wellbeing, and the right to employment opportunities for all.

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OUR STORY

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When I was 5, my parents told me the challenges they encountered as orphans. My mum became an orphan when she was 8 months old, while my Dad became an orphan at the age of 1. As destiny brings people together, they decide to settle down in their youth as orphans, though. When they told me a history of what they went through as kids without parents. They started telling me this history when I was 5 years old. I cried from time to time, and I began helping the needy with food. Whenever my mum gave me food, I would not eat all of it, I would share with the orphans we had around us in the community where I came from. My dress was always wet because I spent most of my time fetching water for the elderly in my community. I had three mad people I used to take care of until now. I still take care of one of them who is still alive, popularly known as "APISAH". I'm so emotional that when I see cases like the ones I listed above, I always burst into tears. When I decided to do the gestures, I listed above and from the story of my parents, I said to myself I would create an organization for people like "these." I still didn't stop with this vision as I grew up, I knew God sent me for people like "them", I decided to come up with HOPE SPRING FOR ALL NATIONS with the support of my Husband who has been single handedly funding the organization since 2019. From the name of the organization, I know it's what God wants to use me to bring their wishes to reality or make their wishes arise and become a reality. I believe God blessed us to be a blessing to people like orphans, less privileged, children, and the elderly. I don't feel fulfilled if I find someone who is in need around me and I don't help them.

Key achievements

2022 marked a remarkable year in the Hope Spring for All Nations quest for better living condition within the communities as well as families and in schools. Activities such as providing relief support to 10 internally displaced persons (IDP's) in Mamfe central, Cameroon was carried out in other to address the immediate needs for food and basic household supplies of Internally Displaced Persons at Mamfe Central by providing them with items. After a great interactive and educative discussion, the distribution of relief supplies was donated to each IDP present. They included:1 bag of rice, ½ bag of flour, 3 liters of oil, 1 packet of sugar, 1 bag of salt, 3 bars of soap, and 1 packet of Maggi seasoning.

We equally carried out an activity on integrated commercial food crop farming for sustainable livelihood an

well-being of 30 internally displaced persons (women) in Mamfe central where we trained the 30 identified IDP women in commercial food crop farming, bookkeeping, and personal evaluation to help them keep records of them growth and continuity, as well as how to record incomes from their farms and convert their farming activities into more revenue-generating ventures to improve their standard of living and equally provided them with corn seeds and cassava stems to support their farming endeavors.

PROJECTS CONDUCTED



Providing Relief Support to Internationally Displaced Persons (IDPs) in Mamfe Central, Cameroon

Project overview

This activity report details the provision of relief support to 10 internally displaced persons (IDPs) from the Mamfe community in Cameroon, who were affected by the ongoing conflict creating a critical need for humanitarian assistance. The project sponsored by the founders had a budget of 634,500 FCFA, aimed to address the immediate needs for food and basic household supplies of Internally Displaced Persons at Mamfe Central. This activity prioritizes the fight against hunger, recognizing food as a fundamental human right. Every individual deserves access to sufficient, nutritious food to maintain their health and well-being, the urge to fight against hunger which can lead to malnutrition, impacting both physical and mental health, and hindering individuals' ability to work and contribute positively to society. Furthermore, food insecurity can worsen poverty and inequality, potentially causing social unrest and violence. Therefore, addressing hunger is crucial for building a more just and peaceful world. After agreat interactive and educative discussion, included:

1 bag of rice, ½ bag of flour, 3 liters of oil, 1 packet of sugar,1 bag of salt, 3 bars of soap and 1 packet of Maggi seasoning.

Objective:

The activity aimed to address the immediate needs of IDPs by providing:

- · Food supplies to combat hunger and manage malnutrition.
- Basic household items to support their daily living.

Outcomes of the activity

- Successfully provided immediate relief to 10 IDPs. The project successfully delivered essential supplies to 10 IDPs, alleviating their immediate needs for food and necessities.
- Raised awareness about the detrimental effects of hunger. The activity emphasized the importance of fighting hunger and its devastating consequences on individuals and communities.
- Gained valuable insights into the long-term needs of the IDP community. Interactions with beneficiaries revealed their need for sustainable solutions such as livelihood support, housing, and improved security.

Executive summary

The project titled integrated commercial food crop farming for sustainable livelihood and well-being of



Internally Displaced Persons in Mamfe Central is a one-day training program aimed at elevating the well-being of IDPs and fighting hunger through agricultural project in the cultivation of commercial food crop. This project is aimed at giving hope to the IDPs through a means of sustainable livelihood in what they are most comfortable and vests with which is farming. HSFAN now came in to assist them in knowing how to generate income through food crop production by providing them with corn seedlings, cassava stems and training them on how they can sustainably cultivate their crops by maintaining the fertility and productivity of their soil while cultivating. Also, they were trained on book keeping and personal evaluation to keep records of growth and continuity. The project, which was initiated in the month of January 2022 and implemented in the month of March 2022, succeeded in assisting 30 IDPs household heads (women). This act changed their mindset as they could still hope for a better future at the end of the project. HSFAN spent a total of 874,500 FRS in actualizing this project together with SOWEDA who provided the seeds for cultivation.

Objectives

Main objective:

To integrate commercial food crop farming for sustainable livelihood and well-being of IDPs in Mamfe Central.

Specific objectives:

- The project aims to identify IDPs found in Mamfe Central.
- It aims at coming up with the best way in assisting the IDPs gained sustainable livelihood.
- · Also, to come up with possible methods the IDPs can fully engage in the chosen livelihood.
- · Also, ensure continuity and growth of the business after benefiting from the aid.
- To provide corn seedlings and cassava stems to the IDPs in Mamfe

Short-term Impact of the activity

The activity will for sure record a long-term impact which will be seen after some months and years to come. However, this activity has recorded many short-term impacts, but few will be discussed. Relationship and trust have been built between partners, the team and its partners and the community heads. Relationship is the core to guarantee progress and efficient sustainability of a project and in situations of forceful movements and insecurity, trust gained go a long way in promoting peace talks and limiting violence in a community.

Also, the project observed a change in the mindset of the IDPs as the donation and training left them hopeful again about life and could fore seen better future while taking care of their families and themselves again. Before, they couldn't get good means of livelihood rather, live on the alms they got from people around them but due to the training and donations, they can get money from doing what they like and feed properly.

Analysis of beneficiaries' view:




Figure 1: Satisfaction level

We conducted a beneficiary satisfaction survey to get feedback's from the 30 beneficiaries. The result revealed that, 24 beneficiaries (80% of 30) rated their overall satisfaction with our services as "Satisfied" or "Very Satisfied", 21 beneficiaries (70% of 30) indicated that our services had a positive impact on their lives, 25.5 beneficiaries (85% of 30) would recommend our services to others, 18 beneficiaries (60% of 30) provided positive comments about our services in the open-ended feedback section. The result of the satisfaction chart is presented on figure 1 below

Figure 1 above now represents the distribution of satisfaction levels among the 30 beneficiaries who participated in the survey. 40% were very satisfied and satisfied, 10% were neutral, while 5% were satisfied and very dissatisfied. This shows that out of the 30 beneficiaries surveyed, 24 reported being "Satisfied" or "Very Satisfied" with our services, indicating an overall satisfaction rate of 80%. Additionally, 21 beneficiaries reported a positive impact from our services, representing a rate of 70%. Furthermore, 25.5 beneficiaries expressed a willingness to recommend our services to others, accounting for an 85% recommendation rate. Lastly, 18 beneficiaries provided positive comments in the open-ended feedback section, constituting a rate of 60%. This feedback will continue to guide our efforts in delivering effective and beneficial services to our beneficiaries.

In all, they all were excited and blessed to be given the opportunity to have reliable means of livelihood which guarantees a healthy life and well-being of not only for them but their families at large. They expressed their immerse gratitude to the team for coming up with such a brilliant idea and needing help. Some confessed the fear they had after the displacement was what will become of them as they were forced to leave their resident and start up somewhere new. Due to the project, the fear was no more for this ensures their families, not sleeping with an empty stomach.

Success story

The Integrated Commercial Food Crop Farming project in Mamfe Central, Cameroon has had a significant impact on the lives of internally displaced women. By providing them with the opportunity to engage in sustainable farming practices, the project has not only improved their livelihoods but also contributed to their overall well-being. Through training and support, these women have been able to cultivate crops and generate income, enabling them to provide for themselves and their families. Additionally, the relief support provided to internally displaced persons in Mamfe Central has alleviated some of the hardships they have faced due to displacement. This support has helped improve their living conditions and provided them with essential resources for their daily needs.
